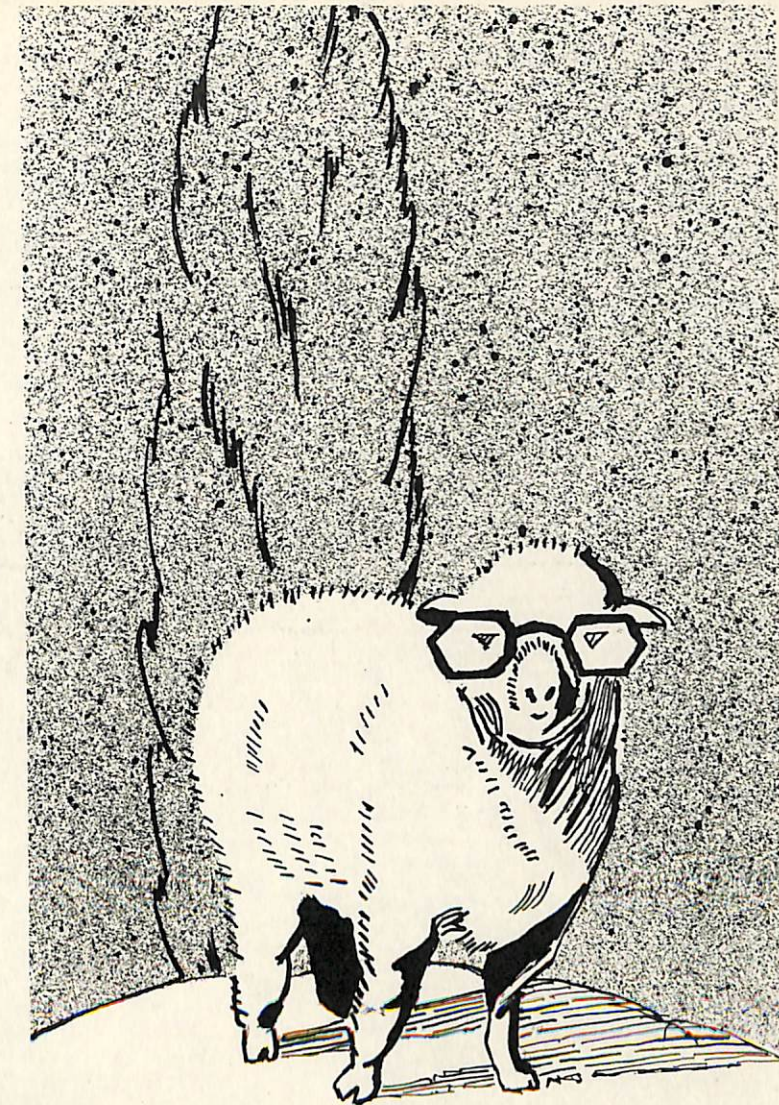

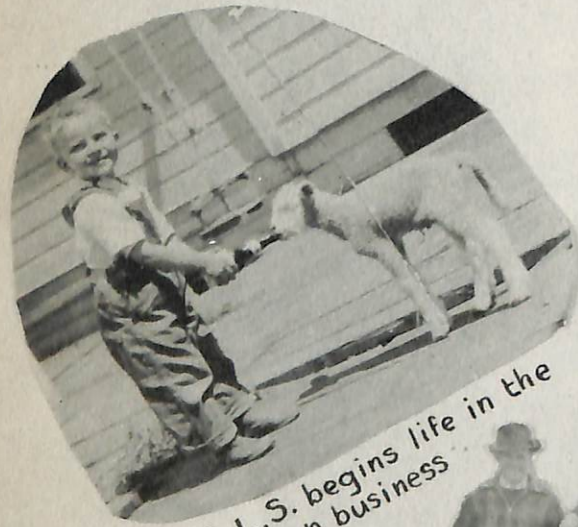

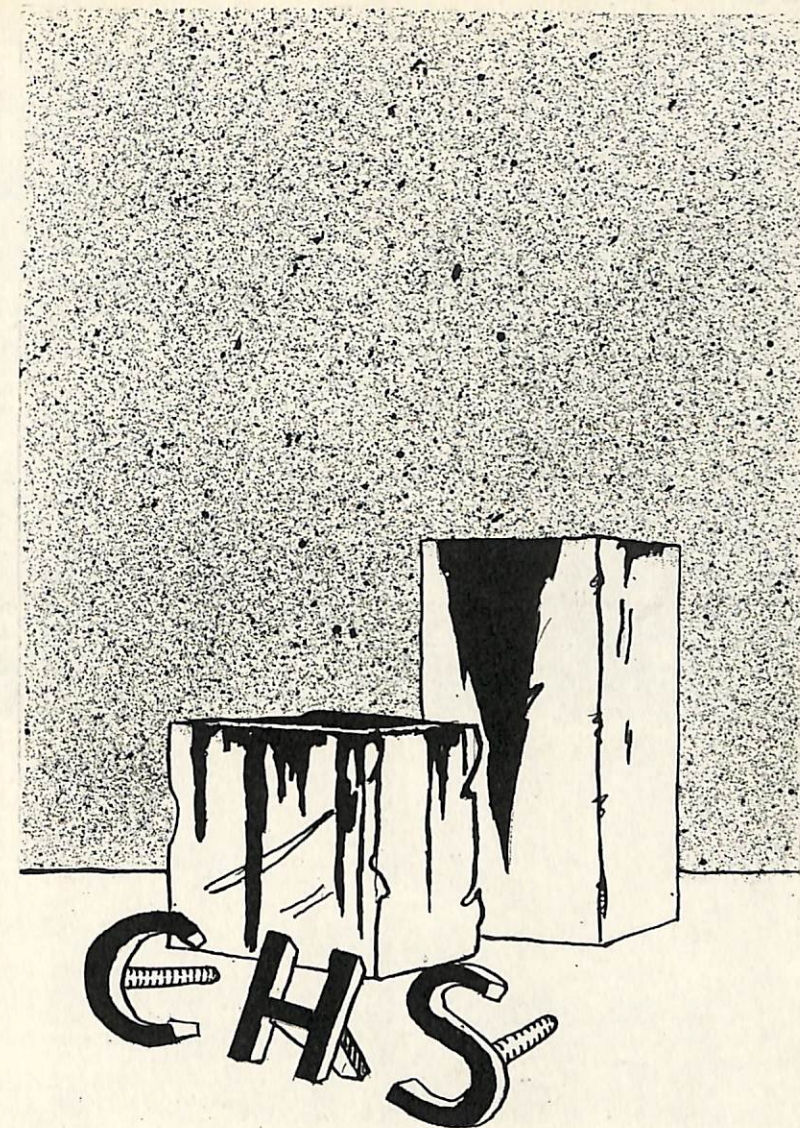
Freshman Class History

Following this an amusing program was given by the girls.

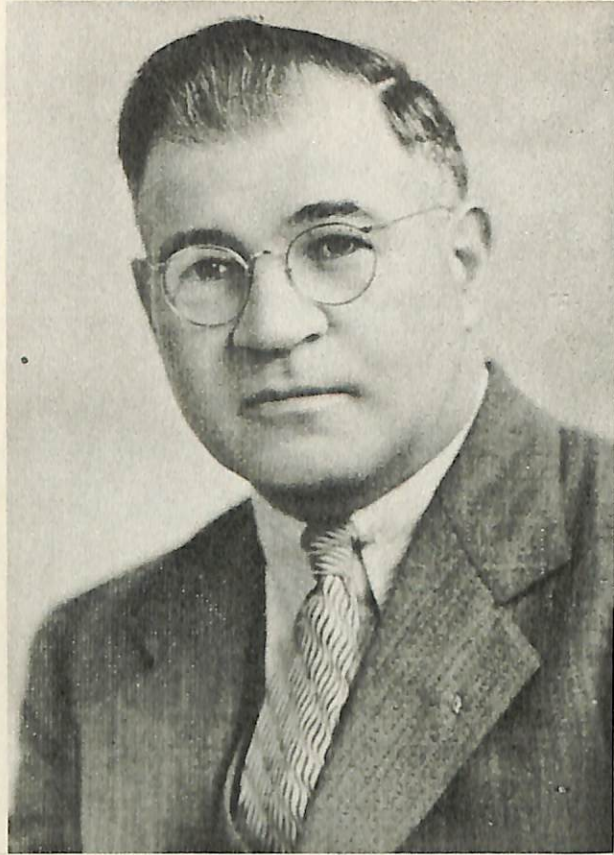
T. N. T. Football Dance

one of the biggest attendances ever attained in this high school. The characters were as follows:

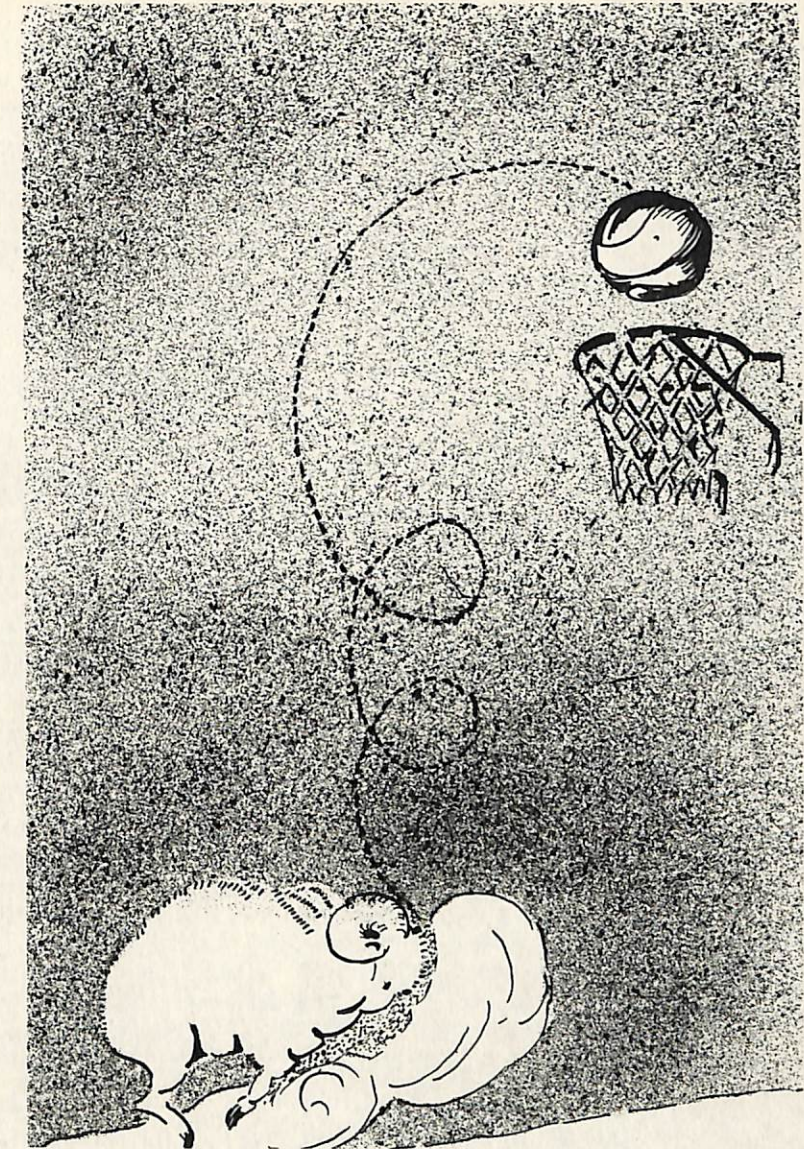
