



THE NEW BUILDINGS

Last summer under a PWA project a separate gymnasium building and a six room grade building with a suite of offices were added to our school system, making a great improvement in the appearance of our school grounds as well as in the efficiency of the school program. Both









The New Grade Building

In anticipation of a building program the School Board purchased 23 lots adjacent to the original school site. The town council by resolution closed the streets and alleys separating the various lots making the property into one plot of approximately eleven acres. This gives space for an athletic field with ample areas for grade playgrounds. It is planned to fence the portion used by the grade pupils from the streets as a safety measure.








Second Grade Room



The old grade building is being remodeled with concrete stairways, sanitary lavatories, new wiring and ceilings in order to eliminate the undesirable features of the structure which for more than thirty years served for grade school purposes. The space will be used for lunch room, shops and music rooms.

A central heating plant in a separate fire-proof structure furn-ishes heat for all four buildings.










J. N. T. Club



The high school auditorium was decorated with bundles of shocked grain, black cats and witches.






