


The Rambouillet staff, as sponsor of the poll of top personalities, held the election during a noon hour. All grades, junior high through senior high, were allowed to vote.

The winners of these high honors were elected by popular vote of the student body.



#### Activities of C. H. S.



Decked out in their gay and colorful costumes are the varsity cheerleaders of C.H.S. With the help of the Pep Club they lead the team on to victory with peppy yells.



Other highlights of this very eventful year were choosing class rings, class parties, the Junior Prom and the Junior-Senior Banquet.





In the decorated auditorium on the Monday night following the dance, the Juniors gave a banquet honoring the Seniors.






