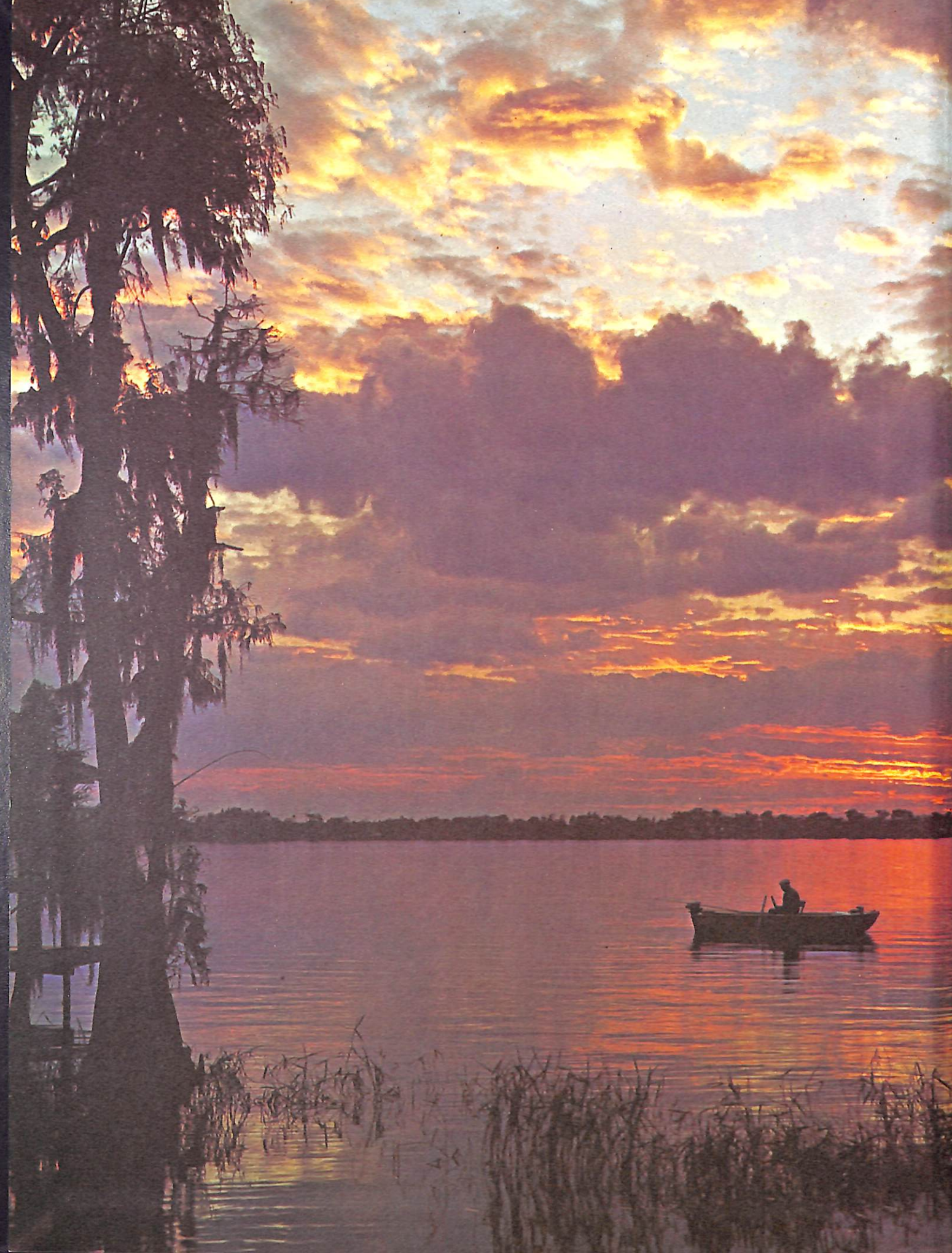

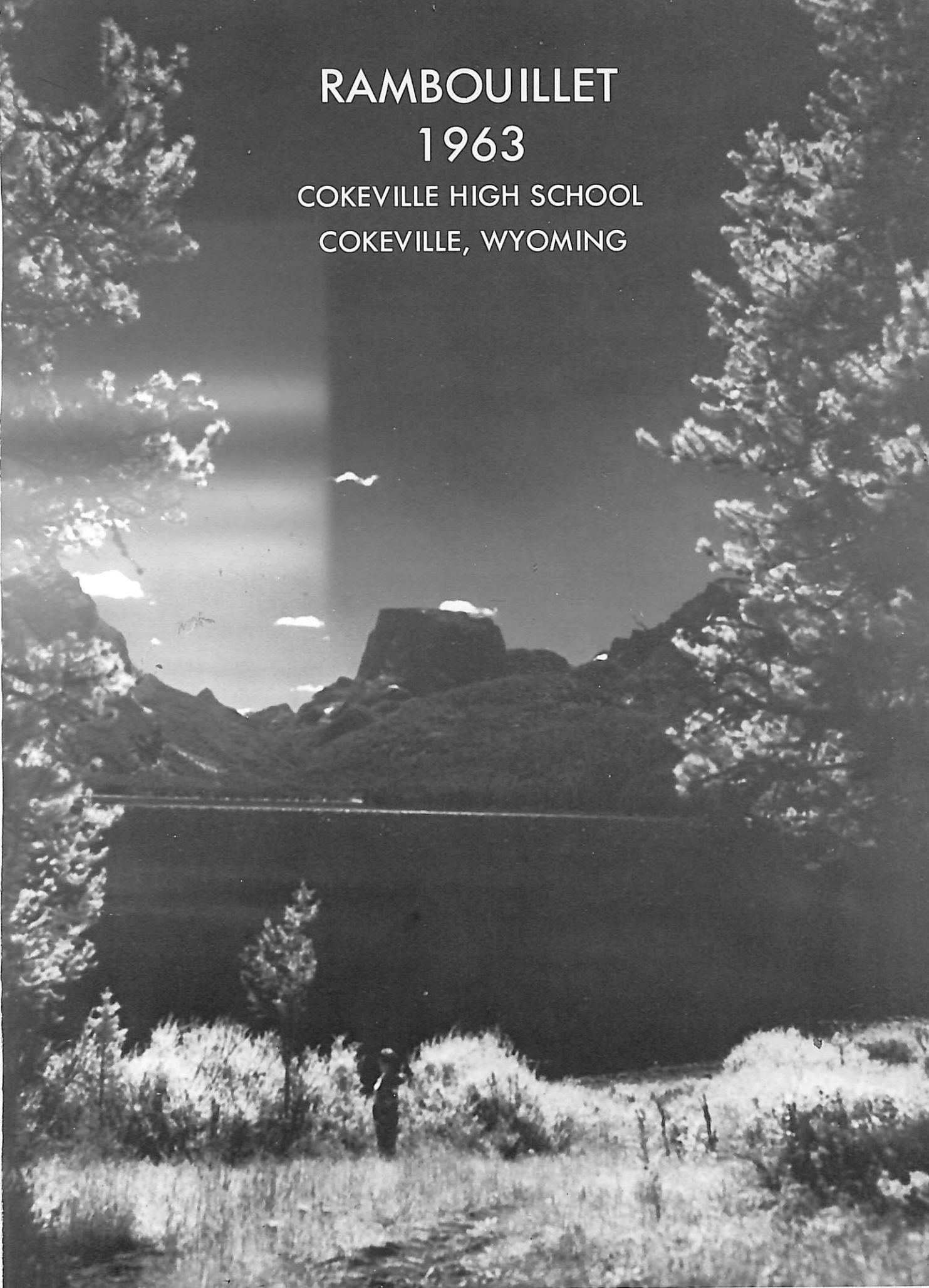

Other activities included two music clinics which were held at Kemmerer and Pinedale.





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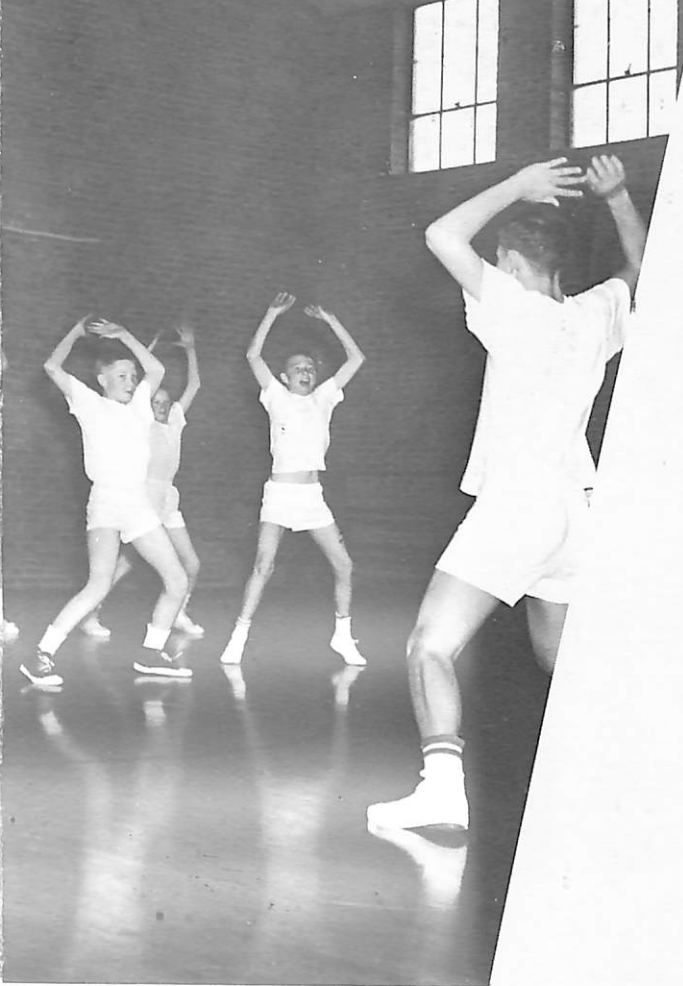

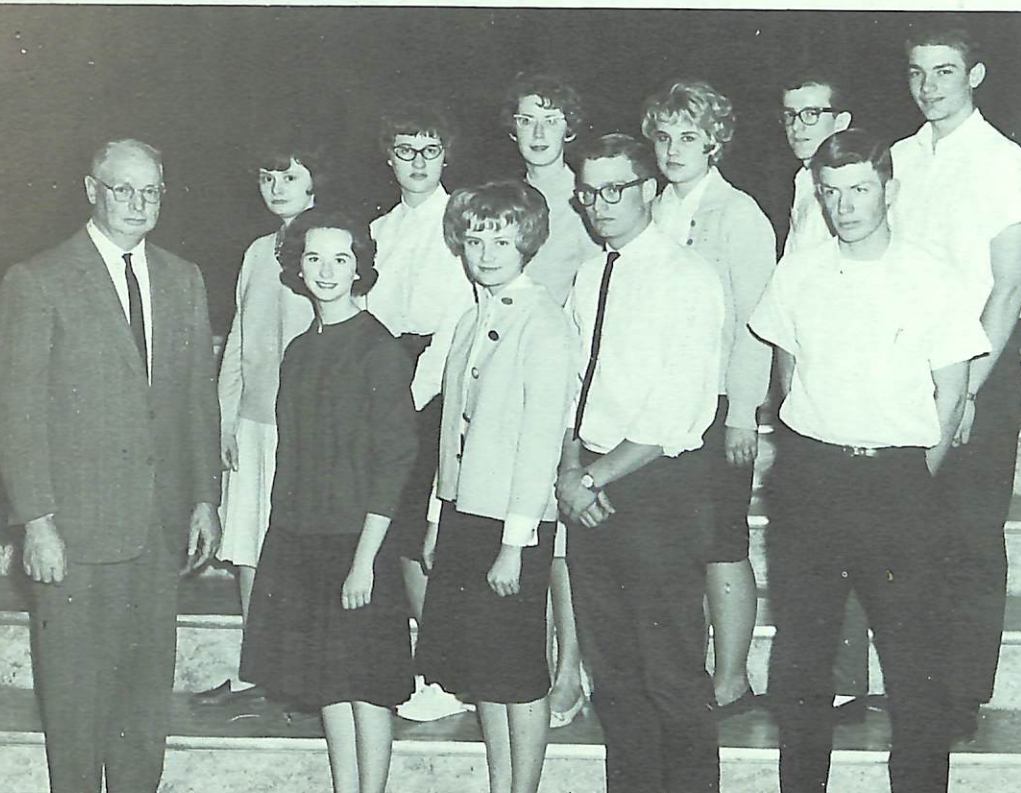

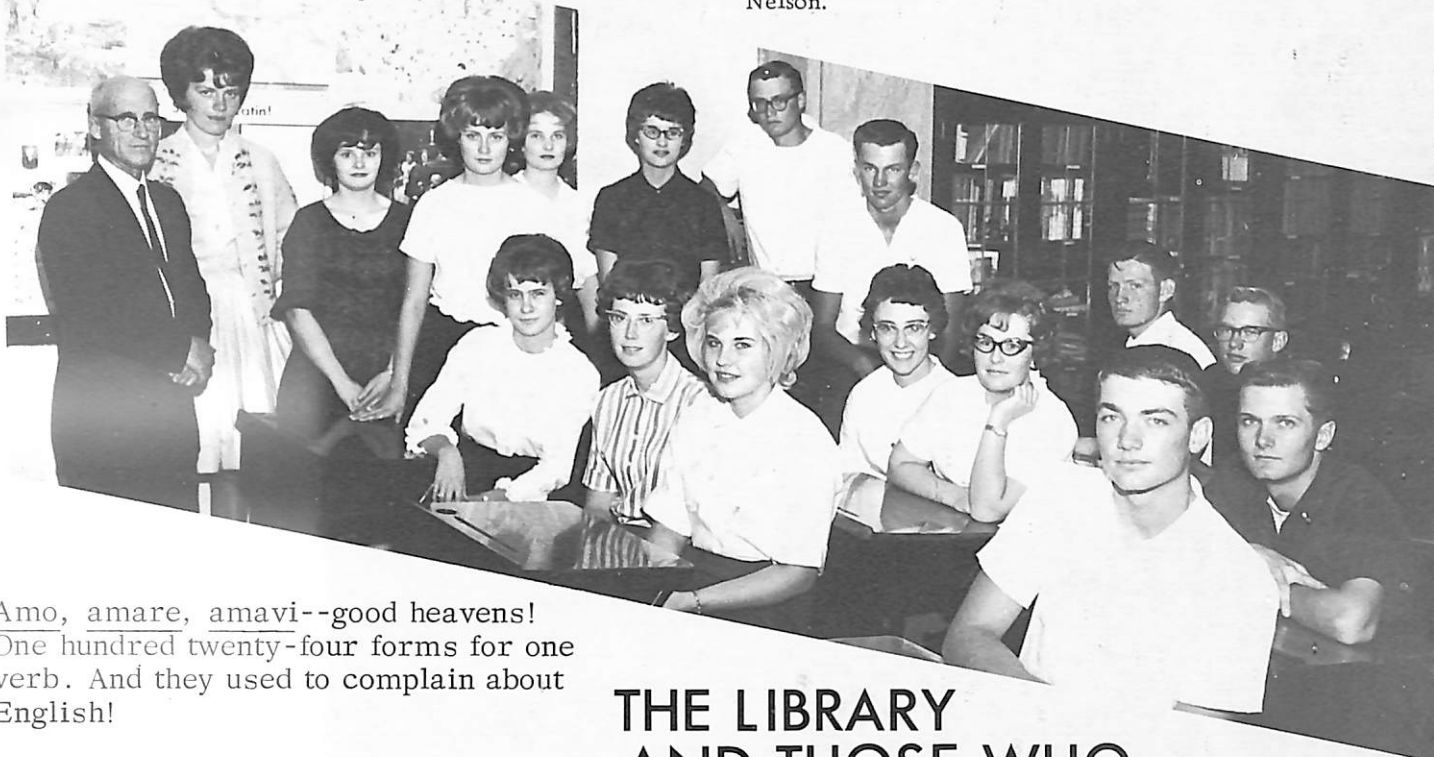

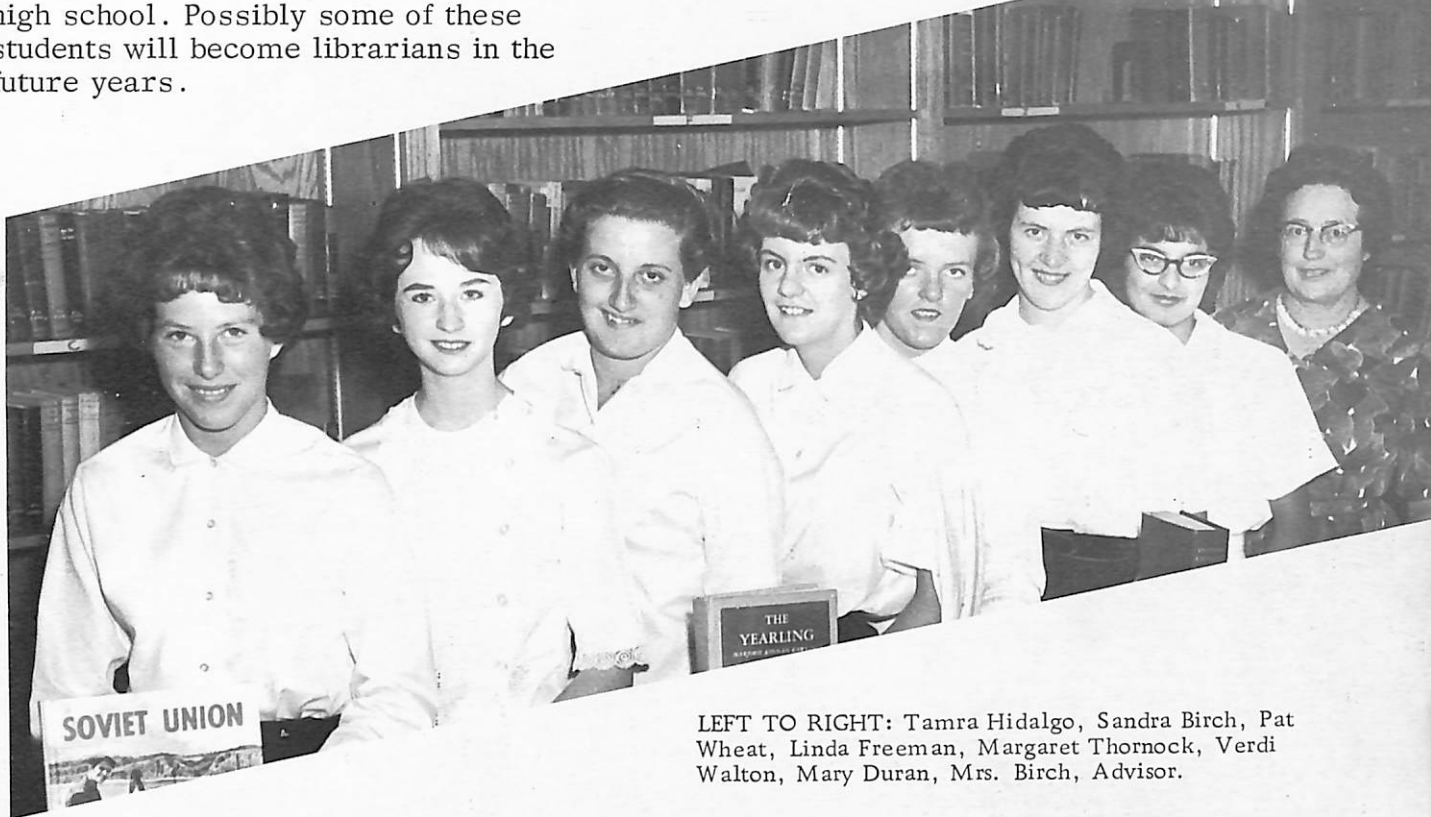

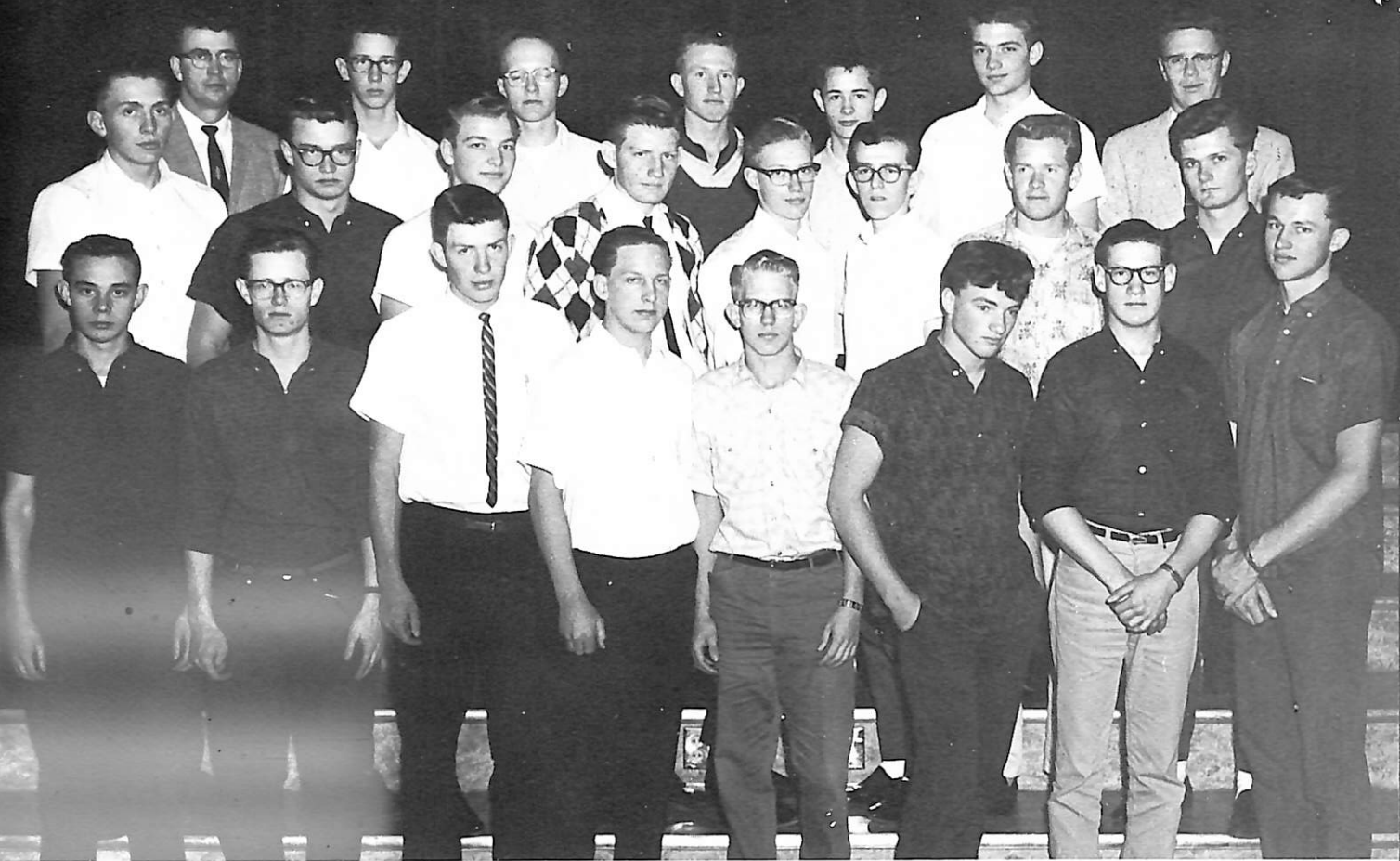

The basketball season started in December and ran until March, with many ups and downs. Some members of the team are still wearing battle scars!

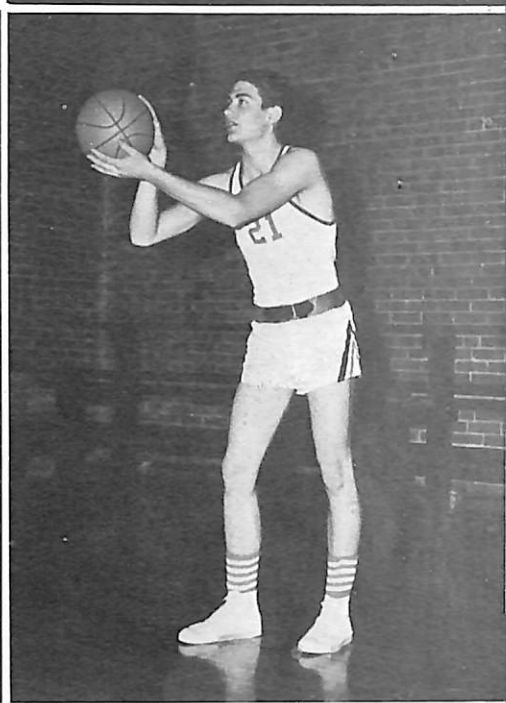
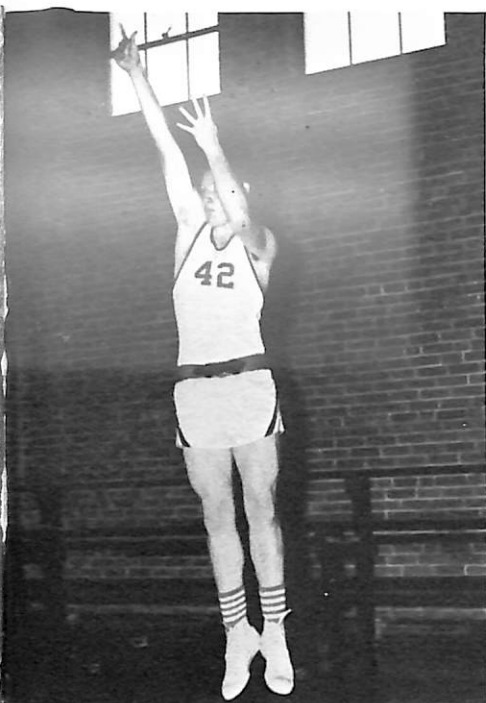
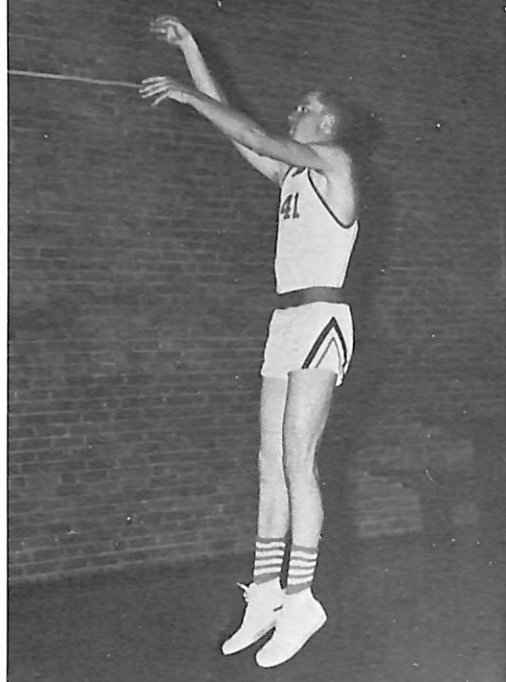

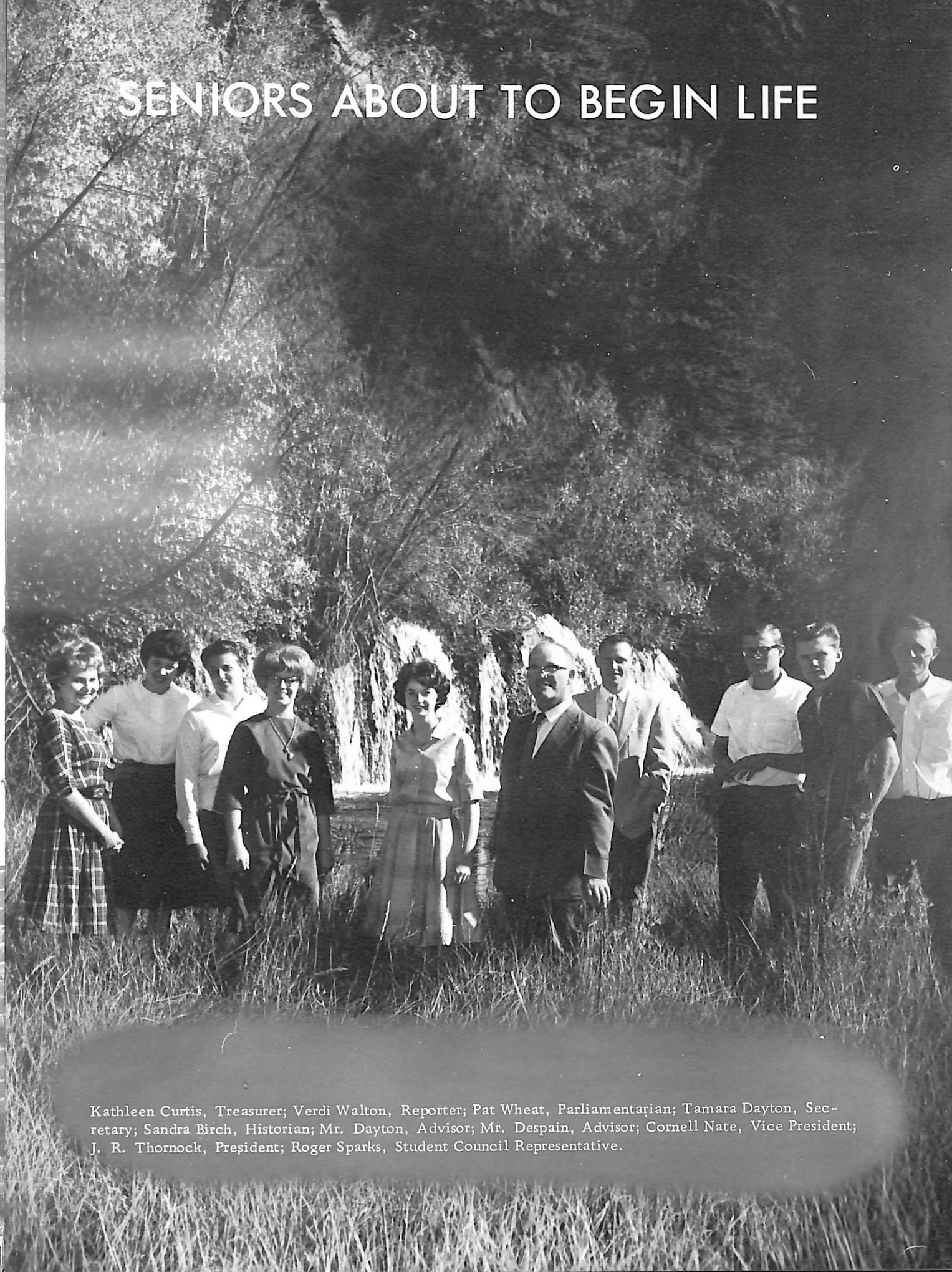
ATHLETES OF THE FUTURE, WITH JR. PEP CLUB BACKING

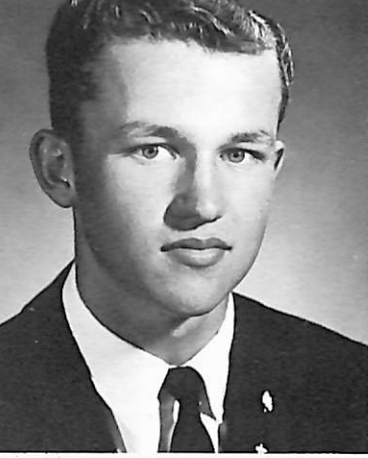

The excellent meal was prepared by the ladies of the Guild, thus making it possible for all Mothers of the Junior Class to sit and enjoy themselves.



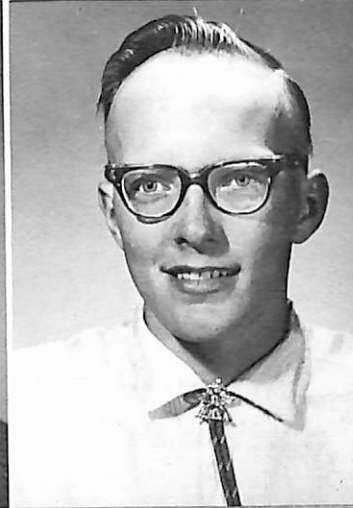
