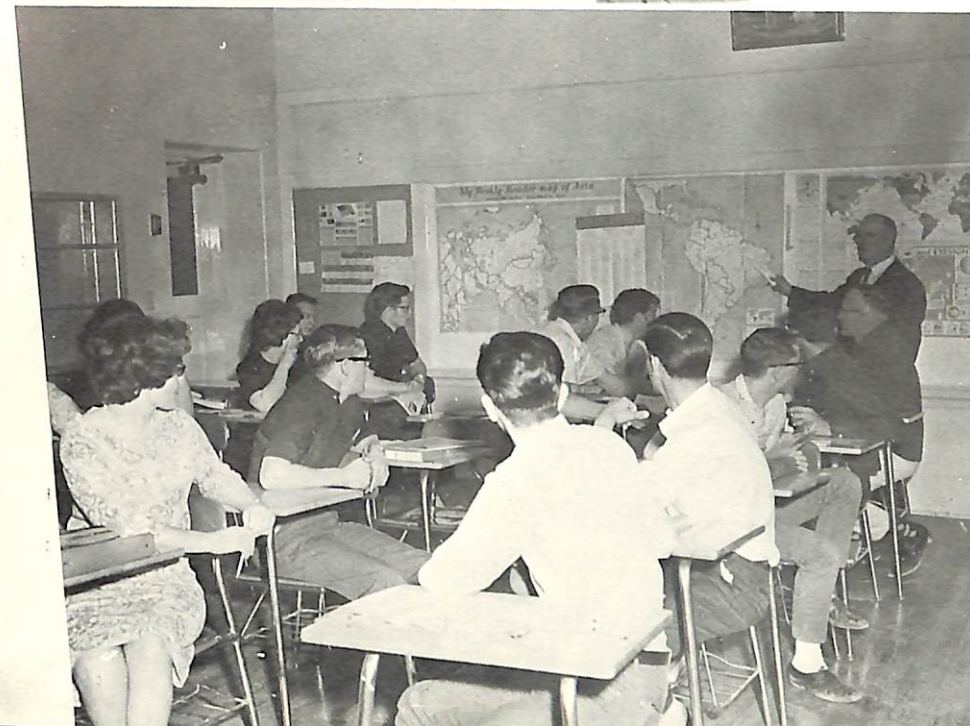
MATHEMATICS PROVIDE THE VOCABULARY OF SCIENCE

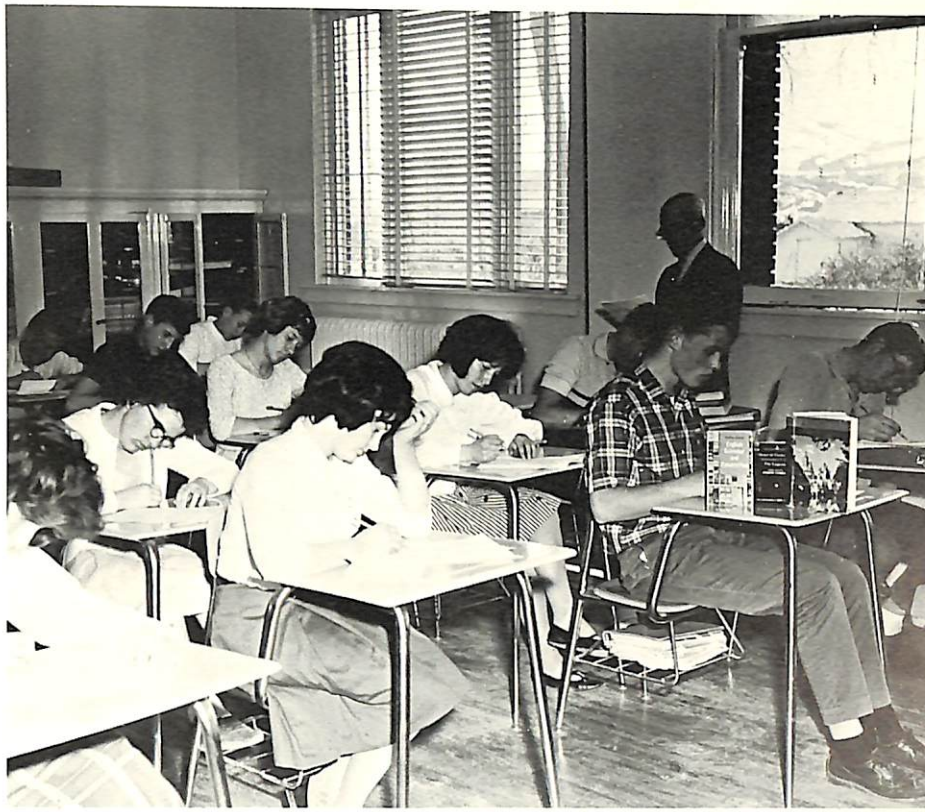
SOCIAL STUDIES STRESS CITIZENS RESPONSIBILITIES
